TV License Brand Ambassadors, Big Ben and Chikune Launch TVL Competition 2016

Along with the arrival of the Namibian National Broadcaster's TV License Renewal Period 01 – 30 September 2016/17, the nbc officially launched its latest TV License Competition.

Namibian Annual Music Award (NAMA) male and female artist of the year, Big Ben and Chikune, are the official brand ambassadors for television licenses across the country. The duo launched the competition on Monday, 12 September 2016 at News Café in the capital, Windhoek.

According to the Broadcasting ACT, Act number 9 of 1991, every person in Namibia who owns a television set must pay a television license fee. With the launch of the competition, the broadcaster seeks only to incentivize and reward loyal and paid up TV License citizens.

This year, lucky winners stand a chance of walking away with N\$1 000.00 weekly via the SMS competition. The ultimate grand prize winner will ride away with a brand new Suzuki AX 100 Motorcycle. To stand in line to win, all Namibians have to do is be a paid-up TV License holder for the year 2015/16 as well as 2016/17 and answer the question:

Before the end of which month must all Namibians pay or renew their nbc TV License?

Plus, how much is the annual TV License fees for the different categories?

The answer options are as follows:

- a) 30th September, N\$204 for non-pensioners; N\$60 for pensioners; N\$220 per TV set for businesses**
- b) 28th February, N\$104 for non-pensioners; N\$60 for pensioners; N\$220 per TV set for businesses**
- c) 31st October, N\$304 for non-pensioners; N\$60 for pensioners; N\$220 per TV set for businesses**

Paid-up TV License holders can SMS the correct answer A, B or C to 66633. One SMS is charged at N\$5. The more viewers SMS, the higher the chances of winning! The official draw will take place on 01 November 2016.

ABOUT Digital Terrestrial TV (www.nbc.na/dtt_home)

Digital television is a new way of broadcasting television. Although digital terrestrial television changes the way pictures are sent to your TV, it won’t change the way you watch television.

Since the beginning of television, we’ve been watching what is known as ‘analogue television’: TV signals are broadcast using radio waves, which are picked up by an aerial and sent down a wire to your TV, the analogue television receiver. Your set then changes the analogue signal into pictures and sound. nbc boasts altogether with Six (6) channels on its DTT bouquet – nbc1, nbc2, nbc3, One Africa, TBN and EduTV.
